

FACT SHEET FOR METROPOLITAN COMMUNITY CHURCHES (MCC)

Since its founding in 1968 by Rev. Troy Perry, the Universal Fellowship of Metropolitan Community Churches (UFMCC, commonly known as MCC) has been at the vanguard of civil and human rights movements by addressing important issues such as racism, sexism, ageism, homophobia, transphobia, and other forms of oppression. MCC has been on the forefront in service to and advocacy for people living with HIV/AIDS, in the struggle towards marriage equality in the United States and other countries worldwide, and continues to be a powerful voice for lesbian, gay, bisexual and transgender (LGBT) equality and other human rights movements.

- The MCC Moderator is Reverend Doctor Nancy L. Wilson. She is the second person to serve as Moderator and one of the few women to lead an international Christian denomination. She has served in this position since October 2005. Wilson founded the Free Spirit MCC, an outreach to women incarcerated at California Institute for Women, and sponsored the first three Conferences for “MCC Women in Ministry.” Her published works include: *Our Tribe: Queer Folks, God, Jesus and the Bible* (Alamo Press) and *Amazing Grace*, with Fr. Malcolm Boyd; her prayers and poems are included in *Race and Prayer* edited by Malcolm Boyd and Chester Talton (Morehouse Press). Appointed by U.S. President Barack Obama in 2010, she is a member of the President’s Advisory Council on Faith-Based and Neighborhood Partnerships. Wilson is a popular preacher and speaker, has been honored with the first “Lazarus Award” from the Presbyterian Church, and was invited to preach at the Earl Lectures at Pacific School of Religion in January 2002.
- MCC Founder, Reverend Troy D. Perry, served as the first moderator and is an internationally recognized human rights activist and has received honors from many human rights organizations, including honorary doctorates from Episcopal Divinity School, Samaritan College and Sierra University along with awards from the American Civil Liberties Union, the Human Rights Campaign, the Lazarus Project, and the Gay and Lesbian Press Association.
- MCC is the largest international organization for public education about homosexuality and Christianity.
- MCC congregations have an aggregate annual operating budget in excess of \$20 million USD.
- MCC Headquarters has an annual operating budget of approximately \$2 million USD.
- More than fifty percent (51.6%) of MCC clergy are women.
- MCC has members in every state in the United States and congregations in 38 states.
- The largest MCC churches are Resurrection MCC (Houston, TX), Sunshine Cathedral MCC (Fort Lauderdale, FL), and MCC Toronto (Toronto, Ontario, Canada), each with a membership exceeding 600.
- MCC holds observer status in the World Council of Churches, is a full member of the Danish National Council of Churches, participates in the programs of the National Council of Churches (U.S.), and has full membership in four U.S. state councils: California, Colorado, Hawaii, and North Carolina.
- AIDS has dramatically affected MCC churches. Since 1982, an estimated 6,000 MCC members have died of AIDS and related diseases, yet the epidemic has also brought many new members who are facing questions of life and death.
- MCC clergy are trained by more than twenty seminaries of mainline Christian denominations.
- An increasing number of the children of lesbian or gay parents are active in MCC, and many congregations offer specialized ministries to meet the spiritual needs of these children.
- MCC clergy have offered Holy Unions, Marriage and other commitment ceremonies to bless same-sex couples since 1969.
- Elected leadership of the denomination consists of the Moderator and eight Governing Board members.
- MCC follows a congregational form of church government with self-governing local congregations. Local churches are represented in an international General Conference that meets once every three years.
- Twenty-one MCC congregations have been victimized by the antigay hates crimes of arson or firebombing.

Social Action

Working to talk less and do more, we are committed to resisting the structures that oppress people and standing with to those who suffer under the weight of oppressive systems, being guided always by our commitment to global human rights.
